Re: Protection of Purchased Surface Water

Dear Ms. Bleed:

We have reviewed the statutory and case law regarding use and protection of surface water appropriations. Nebraska law provides an appropriator the right to use all of their appropriation, assuming that such use is reasonable and not waste, as long as it remains under their control. Abandonment to the natural stream in the context of seepage or return flow requires an intent to abandon. Specifically in this case the intent for use of the water is to make sure it passes the appropriate state line gages to help Nebraska's compact obligations. As a result, no intent to abandon exists and the intent of the Legislature, the Department and the affected Natural Resources Districts would be subverted by making such water available to downstream appropriators.

Likewise, as we have stated on many occasions, water acquired for Compact compliance purposes can be protected from diversion by other downstream appropriators. This protection is complete for storage water that is acquired and is limited for natural flow acquired only by the right of senior appropriators to make a call for water.

The Department has no legal obligation to protect return flows for downstream appropriators from efforts by senior upstream appropriators that limit or recapture seepage or return flows.
